I. Call to Order

Rector Meese called the meeting to order at 12:00 p.m.

II. Recognitions

A. Appreciation Plaque Presentation to Outgoing Representative

Rector Meese presented Jonathan Dubois, Student Body President, a plaque in recognition of his board service and invited him to introduce his successor, Griffin Crouch. Mr. Dubois thanked the board for their support and informed the board that Mr. Crouch will be a creative and collaborative partner with providing students the resources they need for a positive student experience and position them for professional success.

Rector Meese congratulated Nilima Mow and Solon Simmons for being reelected to another term as the President of the Graduate and Professional Student Association and the Faculty Senate President, respectively. The board looks forward to continued collaborations with Ms. Mow, Mr. Simmons, and Ms. Spence.

C. Recognition of Early Identification (EIP) Graduating Students

Rector Meese recognized the 2026 graduating class of the Early Identification Program (EIP). Rose Pascarell, Vice President of University Life, provided an overview of the EIP program, highlighting its 40th anniversary, and introduced Alpachino Hogue, Executive Director of EIP. Dr. Hogue introduced EIP student speaker,

Monica Amaya, who is the first in her family to pursue higher education and is passionate about turning her achievements into opportunities for those continuing in the EIP program.

Ms. Amaya praised the EIP program and the support it provided her academically and as a leader, which culminated in her receiving the University Scholars Award, a full tuition scholarship. EIP provided a sense of belonging as a first-year student. With the addition of Costello College scholarships, she was able to expand her network with industry leaders and provide her future career path. She is now an EIP mentor, providing current participants like her sister the skills, confidence, and mindset to succeed. She expressed appreciation to supporters, staff, and leaders of the EIP program for encouraging limitless potential.

Rector Meese directed board members to the information in the board materials and the pamphlet at their seats for this year's Jack Wood Award recipients. Traci Kendall, Executive Director in the Office of Government and Community Relations, was recognized to present the following awards:

III. Approval of the Minutes

A. Full Board Meeting on March 31, 2026 (ACTION ITEM)

Rector Meese reconvened the meeting at 1:45 p.m.

Rector Meese called for any corrections to the Full Board Meeting Minutes for March 31, 2026 that were provided for review in the board meeting materials. Hearing no corrections, the minutes stood **APPROVED AS WRITTEN**.

IV. Rector's Report

Rector Meese began by celebrating a few recent events: the EIP program, which encompasses a nine-year journey for each graduating student; the opening of the Activities Building on April 16 was led by hospitality and events management classes; and the Scholarship Celebration not only recognized scholarship recipients and donors but was also a great networking opportunity.

Board members were encouraged to attend the following upcoming events:

- Tuesday, May 5 – OSCAR Celebration of Student Scholarship and Impact
- Thursday, May 7 – Legacy Society Luncheon
- Thursday, May 14 – Spring Commencement

Referring to the Chronicle of Higher Education article specific to board members' text messages and resulting public comments, Rector Meese noted that his on-the-record quote was left out of the article: "It is not possible to get any meaningful insight into board operations by pulling select private text messages out of context. What matters are the totality of the conversations had on the record at board meetings including votes cast, and results achieved, which contributes to the university's continued success." The actions of the board speak for themselves and are on the record.

Rector Meese informed the board of the work that will take place at the Annual Meeting on July 31, including the reorganization of board leadership, President Washington's evaluation, and his goals for the next year. Visitors Caswell and Misener will coordinate and prepare the slate of nominees for leadership elections and committee appointments.

The terms for Visitors Parks, Schindler, Taylor, and Rector Meese will end on June 30. If not reappointed, the rector stated he has appreciated his time on the board and added it has been a distinct pleasure to serve as the rector.

V. President's Report

President Washington described the university as being in a reasonable position, but with challenges from outcomes related to four existential shocks impacting how George Mason will be managed.

Highlights:

- Enrollment: Increased undergraduate enrollment led to a small overall enrollment increase after the decline in foreign graduate students. Mason graduates have a 92% positive outcome, with 73% employed in Virginia, the greatest return on investment anywhere in the commonwealth.
- Rankings: Overall rankings are strong; Mason remains a great value and is the only large Opportunity College and University (Carnegie Foundation & ACE) from Maine to Florida.
- New development: This year saw the grand opening of three facilities: Fuse at Mason Square, the Activities Building, and the Spiritual and Interfaith Center on the Fairfax Campus. Nexus234 was launched as a new community built around the SciTech campus.
- Funding support: There are significant permanent and one-time funds in the Virginia House and Senate budgets; however, future permanent funding support will be difficult given state budget constraints.
- Research and education: Despite expenditures slowing in a difficult environment, Mason launched the Grand Challenge, the AI, and Data Center Initiatives, along with the Nexus234 Innovation District in Manassas.

Four existential shocks are impacting higher education nationwide:

- Fiscal: As a result from the actions of the federal government, there are significant losses from the reduction in graduate students and direct and indirect research cuts.

- Demographic: The “enrollment cliff” is here and will reduce the number of students graduating from high school by 15% for the next five to nine years. Direct Admissions, ADVANCE, and other programs were put into place to address this issue and the university is working to mitigate the decline in foreign graduate enrollment.
- Technological: Institutions must deliberately manage AI’s problems and solutions and also protect against cyberattacks resulting in Mythos AI capabilities.
- Political: Ongoing debates on DEI, free speech and academic freedom, Title IX, and civil rights has impacted George Mason more than most institutions. The war involving Iran could lead to stagflation or a sharp recession in the near term, which the university will need to establish foundational programs to mitigate outcomes.

This is a time of great clarity of the challenges the university is facing with roughly eighteen months to implement changes based on the following questions:

1. How should education be reimaged in the coming environment? Academic unit task forces, called Reimagining Education to the Doctorate (RED), will address adjustments or modifications to degree programs that the country expects from higher education.
2. What can be adjusted through the implementation and optimization of the university Budget Model process? The process includes three steps:
 1. The University Budget Model is applied to each academic unit.
 2. In collaboration with the Provost’s Office, units develop stabilization plans aimed at optimizing credit hour, college/school enrollment, and operating cost.
 3. In collaboration with the Provost’s Office, units are rebased and subsidized for success.
3. How can university level services and support transform when programs are being eliminated by the federal government? The university is exploring new ways to fund students and support mechanisms.

President Washington concluded by stating that if the board approves the proposed increase, Mason’s combined tuition and mandatory fees will be the lowest of Virginia’s R1 doctoral institutions. Recognizing the challenge any increase presents to students and families, the university is managed well and the proposed increase is important to sustain university faculty and staff.

Discussion ensued:

Visitor Rosen asked for President Washington’s thoughts on the Yale Committee on Trust in Higher Education Report. President Washington responded that he thought their faculty did a great job, but the outcomes apply to institutions like Yale and are generally not transferable to Mason.

Before moving to Committee Reports, Rector Meese recognized the newly elected Undergraduate Student Representative, Griffin Crouch. Mr. Crouch expressed how he is looking forward to working as a liaison with the board, university leaders, and faculty. He wants to deliver on the Mason promise, noting that faculty working conditions are student learning conditions. President Washington added that Mr. Crouch has been active in student leadership for many years and is experienced with student and campus issues.

Rector Meese recognized Vice Rector Shrivastava to provide remarks. Vice Rector Shrivastava thanked Rector Meese for his graciousness, professionalism, and the work he devoted as acting rector to lead through the unprecedented nature of the board and ensure all new members were engaged. The vice rector led the room with applause.

Vice Chair Caswell reported on the Finance and Land Use Committee meeting on April 15, providing a summary of the presentations received by Dan Stephens, Interim Senior Vice President and Chief Financial Officer; Julie Zobel, Senior Vice President and Chief Operating Officer; and Alex Iszard, Assistant Vice President of Planning, Design and Construction.

Vice Chair Caswell noted the committee voted to bring the following action items to the full board:

- The FY27 Operating Budget, including the recommended:
 - 3.5% increase in in-state undergraduate and graduate tuition, which equates to a 1% and 1.4% increase in out-of-state undergraduate and graduate tuition respectively, and
 - A 3.5% increase in Mandatory Student Fees;
- The proposed Six-Year Capital Plan, which authorizes projects due for initiation in FY27 that only utilize Mason funding, as well as those being submitted to the Commonwealth for funding approval;
- An increase to the existing Atlantic Union Bank line of credit by up to \$15 million, as well as approving the establishment of a new Wells Fargo line of credit for up to \$75 million;
- Schematic designs for the following projects:
 - Telecom Infrastructure Phases II & III
 - Potomac Heights Roof Replacement
 - Mason Pond Garage Repair Phase I
 - EagleBank Arena HVAC Replacement, which also included an increase in the project budget;
- The annual Land Use Certification submission, which notes the acquisition of townhomes on the SciTech campus; and
- The delegation of authority for tax-exempt debt financing reimbursement declarations to both the President and Senior Vice President/Chief Financial Officer, as well as any other senior leadership role within the university designated by the President.

Vice Chair Caswell **Moved** that the Board approve the FY27 University Operating Budget, Tuition and Fees as they are provided in the meeting materials. The motion was **SECONDED** by Visitor Altman.

C. Athletics Committee

Chair Montano reported on the Athletics Committee meeting, providing a summary of the presentations provided by Marvin Lewis, Assistant Vice President and Director of Athletics; Tony Skinn, Men's Basketball Head Coach; and Malcolm Grace, Deputy Athletic Director of Compliance and NCAA Governance.

D. Audit, Risk, and Compliance Committee

Rector Meese informed the board that upon consultation with general counsel, the topics that were to be discussed in closed session are not a legal matter and therefore not eligible for closed session.

Chair Parks reported on the Audit, Risk, and Compliance Committee meeting, providing a summary of the presentations by Derek Butler; Zach Borgerding, Auditor of Public Accounts; Charmaine Madison, Vice President and Chief Information Officer; and Melissa Perez, Assistant Vice President, Research Security Office of Research Integrity and Assurance. Visitor Parks emphasized the need for flexibility in order to resolve and close the audit.

Discussion ensued:

Rector Meese stated that the board is optimistic and encouraged flexibility in order to resolve the remaining issues to continue Mason's important research.

Visitor Moran requested Visitor Purvis restate her comments from the committee meeting.

Visitor Purvis recommended that the university engage the state to formally acknowledge federal authority over the contracts regulated by Federal Acquisition Regulation (FAR). Failure to do so will disadvantage the university compared to peers and jeopardize a key area of research growth, making it essential that the university insist on adherence to FAR standards.

Rector Meese added that auditors are able to work in the classified area and that Patriot Labs will soon have this capability, preventing this issue in the future. This research is critical to the university and the nation.

E. Development Committee

Vice Rector Shrivastava reported on the Development Committee meeting, providing a summary of the presentations by Jenny Herrera, Chair of the GMU Foundation and Trishana Bowden, Vice President of Advancement and Alumni Relations. The committee also received presentations on Mason Now: Power the Possible Capital Campaign Projects from Alpaslan Özerdem, Dean of the Jimmy and Rosalynn Carter School for Peace and Conflict Resolution; Patrick Soleymani, Associate Dean, Outreach and Strategic Engagement, Costello College of Business; and Rick Davis, Dean of the College of Visual and Performing Arts.

Visitor Moran added that Dean Özerdem has been pursuing foreign investment from Qatar for their Point of View project, but Iran's bombing has negatively impacted their capabilities. Solon Simmons, as a professor of the Carter School, added that Qatar's Minister of State will have a campus visit the following week on this matter.

As a result of the closed session discussions under the Acquisition of Real Property Code, Rector Meese **MOVED** that the Board vote to adopt the following resolution:

WHEREAS, Chapter 15, Title 23.1 of the Code of Virginia of 1950, as amended (the "Virginia Code"), establishes a public corporation under the name and style of The Rector and Visitors of George Mason University (the "University") which is governed by a Board of Visitors (the "Board") vested with the supervision, management and control of the University;

WHEREAS, by Article 4, Chapter 10, Title 23.1 of the Code of Virginia of 1950, the University entered into a management agreement with the Commonwealth of Virginia which was enacted as Chapters 76 and 77 of the Acts of Assembly of 2021 (Special Session I) which, classifies the University as a public institution of higher education and empowers the University with the authority to undertake and implement major capital projects, including the acquisition of any interest in land;

WHEREAS, on May 1, 2025, the Board approved the submission of the University's Six-Year Capital Plan which included Faculty Staff Housing ("Capital Plan") and

WHEREAS, the Board deems it desirable and in the best interests of the University to acquire that certain real property discussed in Closed Session on this date (the "Property").

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that

1. the University is authorized to acquire the Property with Non-General Funds at the agreed upon price and upon such other terms and conditions as the President or others authorized to act on his behalf may, in their discretion, deem advisable;
2. the Board hereby authorizes, directs and empowers the President or the Senior Vice President and Chief Operating Officer to execute, for and on behalf of the University and in its name, any and all documents required in connection with the acquisition of the Property,
3. any actions by the aforementioned officers or those delegated to act on their behalf within the authority conferred hereby, taken prior to the date of this resolution, are hereby ratified, confirmed and approved as the acts and deeds of the University; and
4. this resolution is effective immediately.

The motion was **SECONDED** by Visitor Parks.

**RESOLUTION
OF THE
BOARD OF VISITORS OF GEORGE MASON UNIVERSITY**

Authorizing Increasing Existing Line of Credit Authorization by \$15,000,000

WHEREAS, the Board of Visitors (the "Board") previously authorized the financing and refinancing of a portion of the costs of the Fuse Building at Mason Square, which is part of the Arlington campus of George Mason University (the "University"), including costs associated with capitalized interest, financing costs, and related working capital (the "Project"), subject to the limitations and parameters set forth therein; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to such authorization, the Board approved a plan of finance providing for the incurrence of one or more loans in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$68,000,000; and

WHEREAS, the Board has been advised that additional capacity under the existing financing authorization is advisable to provide increased liquidity and flexibility in connection with the Project and related working capital needs; and

WHEREAS, the Board has determined that increasing the previously authorized maximum aggregate principal amount of such loans by up to \$15,000,000, for a revised aggregate amount not to exceed \$83,000,000, is in the best interests of the University; and

WHEREAS, any such loans will continue to be secured by the University's general revenue pledge and shall not constitute a debt or obligation of the Commonwealth of Virginia (the "Commonwealth"), either legal, moral, or otherwise; and

WHEREAS, the loans will continue to be evidenced by one or more credit agreements or similar agreements (each a "Credit Agreement") and promissory notes issued to or for the benefit of the applicable lender (each a "Note");

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that

1. the Board hereby amends the previously approved plan of finance to authorize an increase of up to \$15,000,000, such that the maximum aggregate original principal amount of all Loans shall not exceed \$83,000,000, and otherwise reaffirms the plan of finance described in the prior authorization; and
2. the President of the University or the Senior Vice President and Chief Financial Officer (CFO) of the University is authorized to determine and approve the lenders to provide the Loans and the final terms and conditions of each Loan, including, without limitation,

their original principal amounts and series, maturity dates and amounts, redemption provisions, prices and interest rates, tax status of interest, and whether principal of the applicable Loan may be borrowed, repaid, and reborrowed on a revolving credit basis; provided that:

1. the maximum aggregate original principal amount of all Loans shall not exceed \$83,000,000;
2. any Loan bearing interest at a fixed rate shall have an interest rate not in excess of 6%;
3. any Loan bearing interest at a variable rate shall have an initial interest rate not in excess of 10%; and
4. no Loan shall have a final maturity date more than 20 years after its issuance date; and

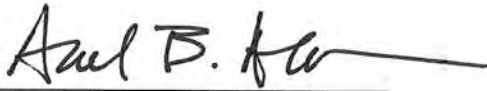

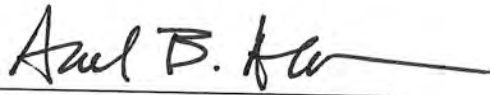

Bethany Letiecq	Faculty	As the leader of the GMU chapter of the American Association of University Professors, I write the Mason BOV with concerns about Visitor Alacbay's dual roles as BOV member and ACTA executive. Serving as a trustee of our public institution of higher education while leading an organization that seeks to undermine our public mission is a clear conflict of interest. ACTA is a named partner to the Heritage Foundation's Project 2025. According to the AAUP's Center for the Defense of Academic Freedom, ACTA has engaged in a "quiet campaign to subdue faculty authority and shared governance, [urging] trustees to overpower presidents and faculty governing bodies when conflicts arise." ACTA's aims are explicit: They believe trustees are the key to bringing universities in line with a conservative, anti-worker political agenda. Their plan for "changing" higher ed clearly seeks to erode the democratic processes embedded in shared governance and academic freedom--two principles that are fundamental to public higher education and our mission to serve the common good. Beyond his role in ACTA, Visitor Alacbay also colluded with former Rector Cully Stimson of the Heritage Foundation as the Youngkin-controlled BOV (including Meese, Rosen, and Peterson as well) worked to politically interfere with our institution and oust President Greg Washington.
